Karen Norman

She has 10 years of varied experience working with children and young people in a range of settings such as Tier 4 Child and Adolescent Mental Health Service, Missing Service in the Children's Society, Independent Fostering Agency and similar organisations. She is now the Home Manager of Safe Steps Pelham House, part of St Christopher's Fellowship, a charity creating brighter futures for children and young people in care.
