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EMOTIONAL RESILIENCE & WELL-BEING CONFERENCE

In coordination with upcoming World Social Work Day and to celebrate our profession, the Teaching Partnership is pleased to announce that there will be a conference on Emotional Resilience and Well-being in social work, free to social workers and social work managers across our partnership, on 15th March 2019.

The conference will begin with presentations from social work academics and psychologists who have completed research on emotional resilience and well-being. In the afternoon, the conference will break out into a number of workshops, chaired by experts, where social workers can access advice and skills on promoting their own well-being and developing resilience.

TEACHING CONSULTANTS
