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### DfE Funding Announcement and Welcome to New Partners



We are very pleased to inform you that the Department for Education (DfE) has confirmed funding for all Teaching Partnerships for a further year (April 2022-March 2023). Thanks to contributions from our primary partner agencies, we were in the fortunate position of not being dependent on this funding in order to continue our Partnership this coming year, however this is still very positive news as it puts us in a stronger position overall and demonstrates the DfE's commitment to the Teaching Partnership programme.

The DfE has also confirmed that they will again be inviting bids for Continuous Improvement Projects for all Partnerships. Any funding awarded for these projects would be in addition to our flat rate funding, so again very positive news. We are awaiting further details on this and when applications will open, but in 2021 we submitted 4 successful applications for Continuous Improvement Projects and were awarded an additional c£125,000 in funding.

We would also like to take this opportunity to welcome Merton Children and Wandsworth Children on board as primary partners. Both agencies have been long standing partners of the Developing Together Social Work Teaching Partnership, but from April 2022 they will be involved in the full programme of Partnership initiatives. All social work practitioners working for these (and other primary partner) agencies, will have access to the full Continuing Professional Development offer and other unique opportunities.

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### Trauma Informed Practice Project Update



As part of our longstanding commitment to developing practitioners across the partnership and building on the fundamental need to embed trauma informed practice across our organisations, the Teaching Partnership is rolling out Trauma Informed Practice training, having secured funding from the Department for Education's Continuous Improvement Fund. It uses the fantastic resources and framework developed by the <u>Scottish</u> <u>Government, led by NHS Education for Scotland</u>. Train the Trainer training has already been delivered to a mixed cohort of 15 upskilled facilitators from across the partnership and in time will be rolled out to every qualified social worker within each primary partner organisation.

This training addresses the need for partnership organisations to become more trauma-informed and the workforce to become:

- more adept at recognising where people are affected by trauma and adversity;
- better able to respond in ways that prevent further harm while supporting recovery; and
- capable of addressing inequalities and improving life chances.

The training will be held over 4 sessions covering topics such as: What is Trauma Informed Practice, How to Respond to Trauma, How Trauma Can Affect Staff and Tools to use in practice to understanding trauma responses.

Dates for the first few cohorts will be released by the end of March for social workers to begin booking themselves onto. Further dates will be released at regular intervals throughout the year. Keep an eye out for the information from your Workforce Development Leads!



### Research on the Impact of Coaching

Sharon Evans (Partnership Practice Consultant) is undertaking some research related to participants, past and present, taking part in the Coaching & Mentoring post qualifying module offered by Kingston University. Sharon is still in the process of ethical approval but does have interest from the recent participants to take part in the research. Watch this space for further updates!

#### Social Worker Wellbeing

So far, in 2022, this project has been focusing on the creation and collation of resources for the wellbeing resource library as well as the testing and release of elearning modules to support learning in bite-sized chunks. It was agreed that the elearning would be aimed primarily at Social Work Students and NQSWs to better support social workers at the beginning of their careers. The modules are currently being evaluated by a test group, and will be updated and amended based on their feedback.

#### Anti-Racist Practice Lead

Sutton recently appointed an individual to take on some of the functions of their previous Anti-Racist Practice Lead, who recently left the organisation. Andrea Bryant is currently a Service Manager within Sutton Children and she will now also be their Diversity & Inclusion Lead. Whilst Andrea is employed by Sutton, she will work on initiatives and the development of resources that will benefit the whole Teaching Partnership. In May's newsletter we will be sharing more details about what Andrea has got planned!





The new cycle of Research Hubs has begun and we are at the beginning of our 3 month trial of holding two sessions per month with a monthly theme. This was in response to feedback from participants who would like two opportunities to attend each month. The trial is for March, April and May and will be evaluated as to whether this continues or we revert back to once a month. Whatever happens the Hub will continue, exploring research and helping social workers to become more confident in critiquing, applying and even getting involved in research.

The Hub is a great opportunity to keep up to date on research and how to utilise understanding research to support continuing professional development, a requirement for regulation with Social Work England.

Social Work Week 2022







The theme of this year's World Social Work Day on 15 March was 'Co-building a New Eco-Social World: Leaving No One Behind'.

The Teaching Partnership was excited to host what we hope is the the first of many 'Think Family' Conferences on Monday 14 March, with the focus being on Attachment Throughout the Life Course. The aim of our 'Think Family' theme is to bring together adults, mental health and children and families social workers to learn about topics that affect people with lived experience across their life spans. This was an in person event, held at Kingston University Kingston Hill campus, and featured a number of inspiring and knowledgeable speakers. Attendees rated the event very positively, saying that they would take a number of key learning points back to their teams and organisations, including challenging mis-diagnosing of children, parents' own attachment influencing their parenting, and being aware of misuse of terms around attachment by those who are not specifically trained.

Kingston University also hosted their annual social work and social care departmental conference online on 16 March: Social Work in a Global Context: international research and practice during the COVID-19 pandemic. As well as a fantastic selection of speakers from across the world offering a range of reflections and perspectives on the pandemic in the morning, they also ran a number of workshops in the afternoon. This included workshops facilitated by Teaching Consultants from the Teaching Partnership, such as 'Reflections on social work practice during the pandemic: changes, challenges, and surprises' by Anna Holland, NSPCC, and 'Voices from people with lived experiences; reflections on virtual and hybrid working in adult social care' by Marco Orlando and Ulrike Nebel, Kingston Adults. Lucy Roberts and Jabed Hussain from Achieving for Children also facilitated a session on using digital tools in children's social care. Partnership working at its finest!

#### Marte Bergan (Sociology Lecturer, Department of Social Work and Social Care):

"Jamie's Farm came to Kingston Hill Campus on the 10th March to speak to our final year students (BA (Hons) Working With Children & Young People: Social Pedagogy).

Jamie's Farm exists to support disadvantaged young people at risk of academic and social exclusion. Their vision is to ensure vulnerable children nationwide are better equipped to succeed in life. Their unique programme sees small groups of children immersed into farm life during a weeklong residential, or series of day visits, tackling real jobs with tangible outcomes, within a supportive family environment; this encourages cooperation, boosts self-esteem and builds positive relationships. Jamie's Farm improves young people's mental wellbeing, behaviour and engagement with school by building life skills.

On the 10th March, we had the pleasure of meeting Tish Feiden, who is the Lead Therapist at Jamie's Farm, as well as Chloe Thomas who works as an Impact Manager there. We also met with a man called Jack who spent time as an adolescent on Jamie's Farm. Jack told us his story and the impact his time at Jamie's Farm had on his life."

<u>PACT, the Prison Advice and Care Trust</u>, is a pioneering national charity that supports prisoners, people with convictions, and their children and families. They provide caring and life changing services at every stage of the criminal justice process: in court, in prison, on release, and in the community.

They are running a pilot project providing children and family social workers in two women's prisons (HMP Send and HMP Eastwood Park) through charitable funding and have been talking to some universities and local authorities about best practice in social work across the prison walls.

# Peer QA of Placement Reports: Panel Summary of Learnings February 2022



Following the second Peer Quality Assurance (QA) of Placement Reports Panel in November 2021, the third panel was held in February 2022. The panel was chaired by Dale Van Graan from Kingston University and had representation from Wandsworth Children, London Borough of Sutton and Achieving For Children. The group actively sampled and reviewed a range of Placement Reports from contrasting organisations and summarised individual feedback for the PEs. Following this Panel meeting, we have collated the key learnings, covering both areas for improvement, as well as areas of strength in current practice.

#### Anti-Racism in Social Work - Not giving up!



Some of you may remember attending an excellent online session with Wayne Reid (BASW England Professional Officer) back in September 2020, where he delivered a passionate and extremely interesting presentation on **Anti-Racism in Social Work**. The presentation was for everyone. He explored the history of atrocities and brutalities endured by the global Black community and the relevance of anti-racism in social work.

We have continued to focus our efforts at ensuring 'anti-racism' is high on the agenda within the Teaching Partnership. Our '**Black Lives Matter and the Voice of Social Work: Reflective Discussion Groups**' and '**Celebrating Black Voices**' events just for starters. Now, successfully securing funding and appointing an '**Anti-Racist Practice Lead**' within Sutton Children to continue the great work Nashan Wilson started last year - Congratulations Andrea Bryant!

At the next Celebrating Black Voices event in May, we will be launching our new programme of discussion areas for Black Lives Matter and the Voice of Social Work: Reflective Discussion Groups. As social workers, we must continue challenging ourselves and others, in being anti-racist in everything we do. Further details of the groups will be advertised so look out for them and join the discussions and action.

Wayne recently put a statement out explaining that his fixed-term contract as BASW England Anti-racism Visionary ended on 31/01/22. He thanked everyone inside and outside of Social Work for the fantastic support he had been given, over the last 2 years. He attached a phenomenal free online resource he put together to his statement, which includes a selection of articles, research and "integrated images that encapsulate the 'Anti-racism in Social Work' workstreams/movement and have sentimental value for me (as a reminder of my time in the role)" (Wayne Reid).

We would strongly recommend you look at <u>the amazing resource document</u> which will support you on your journey of being anti-racist; maybe use as a resource for discussion in team meetings, group supervision or reflection for yourself. We need to keep this going, 'not giving up!'
