



## On Site Supervisor Programme 2022 Report

May 2022

## Overview

The Onsite Supervisor (OSS) Programme, originally developed and delivered by Dale van Graan, Senior Lecturer, in 2019, was revised and reduced in length in 2020 to incorporate feedback from the Strategic Board, who supported making this mandatory for new Onsite Supervisors but wanted to be realistic about the time commitment of the training. Dale van Graan co facilitates the adapted Programme with Natesha Yanguba, Advanced Social Worker, PE and PA at Croydon ASC.

The adapted programme runs across 3 half days and was delivered virtually in two morning workshops of three hours each, in October-November 2021 and February-March 2022. Most people attended all, or most of each programme. After each session participants were provided with additional learning material and Certificates of Attendance were awarded at the end.

# Participation Oct'21 - Feb'22

Participants included supervisors new to the role, those currently in the role and experienced managers of teams in which student placements occur. Some of the participants have also progressed to the PEPS programme.

#### Evaluation

Although small numbers, there is a constant flow of OSS participants, which shows there is still a need and that our partners are meeting the expectation that all supervisors will be trained and supported. It is really positive that we have supervisors who are not Social Workers as well, as the programme can perhaps be most informative in placements where there is less direct access to qualified social workers. Everyone who has attended has been very enthusiastic and participatory, which makes it so much more enjoyable and, hopefully, beneficial, to everyone, including us as facilitators.

## Recommendations

We recognise that this programme continues to address unmet needs and would maintain our recommendation that attendance on the programme be a minimum requirement for OnSite Supervisors.
