A Reflection on Partnership Working to Address Social Work Student Placement Assessment and Completion during COVID-19

Our colleagues at Kingston University's Department of Social Work and Social Care, Carol Dicken, Dale van Graan and Jane Mathew-Byrne, have recently been published in the International Journal of Practice-based Learning in Health and Social Care.

Their article, 'A Reflection on Partnership Working to Address Social Work Student Placement Assessment and Completion during COVID-19', reflects on the creativity and collaboration of the Developing Together Teaching Partnership, comprising Kingston University and eleven employer agencies. It outlines the way that guidance, procedures, processes and resources were devised and implemented to enable students to continue to learn and be assessed in practice settings. It pays particular attention to the way in which the existing partnership enabled a co-ordinated and swift response to the crisis, which took account of all stakeholders' views and the university's underlying principle of 'no student being disadvantaged' through the restrictions imposed on placements by COVID-19.

In the acknowledgements, the authors thanked students, those providing and supporting placements, tutors and teaching partnership colleagues, for their creativity and willingness to work with uncertainty.

A message from Dale van Graan, Senior Lecturer at Kingston University and former PE Consultant with the Partnership:

After many years at Kingston University, I shall be leaving my permanent post at the end of February, in order to make a few changes in my personal life. There are far too many lovely people to whom I would like to say 'See you later', that I thought it best to include a message in the newsletter.

Having myself completed the practice education course here, I started teaching at KU in the mid 2000s as an hourly paid lecturer, co-teaching on the PEPS programme and doing the MA PETHS course.

Over time that role became permanent, almost full time and, eventually, included leadership of that programme, amongst other responsibilities. One of the most exciting and satisfying periods was my short time as PE Consultant in the Teaching Partnership. This brought me into close collaborative contact with so many more practitioners in practice and gave me opportunity to contribute to resource development in the region. We were a small, but 'perfectly formed' team and we had a lot of fun, dare I say, 'making it up as we went along'!

So, I have very mixed feelings about taking this next step, but I keep reminding myself and others that I am not retiring or leaving permanently, just changing the nature of our relationship. I shall continue to practice as an independent and so know I shall still see so many of you, in different forums, going forwards, and that makes me happy. I do love being a teacher and enabler of learning and nothing makes me more satisfied than seeing a learner reach, or, even better, exceed, their goals. So that is what I have to continue to do.

The Teaching Partnership has again secured over £100,000 of additional government funding from the Department for Education to deliver three new continuous improvement projects for 2022/23.

This time, the projects we have been granted funding for are:

- 1. Independent Clinical Supervision we are offering all social workers working for primary partner agencies who are in their second or third year of practice access to individual or group supervision with an independent clinical psychologist. This will take place over a 6 month period, until March/April 2023, after which the impact will be evaluated and a decision made as to whether to extend this provision. Sessions have been well attended, with 50 year 2 EPD social workers having taken part in this offer of either group, or 1 2 1 clinical supervision sessions so far, with an attendance rate of over 90%!
- 2. **Autism Training** Sharon Evans, TP Lead Practice Consultant has developed new autism awareness training, tailored to social workers who do not work in specialist Learning and Disability teams. The training has been co-developed by a team of experts in this field, as well as input from People of Lived Experience, to support multi-disciplinary working and improved outcomes for children and families directly affected by autism. The training is also being supported by a toolkit developed by the National Autistic Society. The first face to face training pilot cohort was held on 19th January and feedback from social workers who attended has been overwhelmingly positive.
- 3. **Practice Education Consultation & Strategy** In collaboration with Interface and 4 other Teaching Partnerships, 2 Practice Education consultation events (one in the North and one in the South of the country) were held earlier this month. These events brought together key stakeholders from across the Teaching Partnerships, to discuss challenges facing practice education in social work and agree a way forward. We are now awaiting the key recommendations from each event to be drawn together by Interface, which will then be presented to respective Teaching Partnership Strategic Boards (across the national network of TPs) for feedback, before a resulting strategy will then be presented to the social work regulator with a call to action.

Peer QA Panel Update

The fifth Peer Quality Assurance (QA) of placements reports panel was held in November 2022. The panel was chaired by Josie Newton. Senior Lecturer in Social Work, Kingston University, and had representation from Merton Adults, Merton Children and London Borough of Sutton Children and Adults. The group actively sampled and reviewed a range of Placement Reports from contrasting organisations and summarised individual feedback for the PEs. Following this Panel meeting, we have collated the key learnings, covering both areas for improvement, as well as areas of strength in current practice.

Inspection of Wandsworth local authority children's services



Wandsworth Children's Services have been rated 'good' by Ofsted. The report says that the Council:

- \checkmark Is committed to improving the lives of children

The report, published Friday 13th January, follows a visit from Ofsted inspectors in November who said that good progress was being made and children and families were really benefiting from the support and help that they receive. They also praised the culture within Wandsworth and the voice of the child being heard, included and taken into account when making key decisions.

Louise Jones, Principal Social Worker for Children, said: "Proud is an understatement. The sheer hard work and tenacity to be better and become the best for our children, families and communities is in place!"

The Teaching Partnership is pleased to announce that we have once again been awarded funding, in partnership with Kingston University, Achieving for Children, Croydon Children, Merton Children, Sutton Children, Surrey Children and Wandsworth Children, to deliver Cohort 8 of Step up To Social Work. This comes following a successful first year of delivering the programme to Cohort 7 students, who are all set to graduate in March 2023.

The intense, 14 month full-time programme, combining study at Kingston University and placements in the local authority settings, will award graduates a Post Graduate Diploma in Social Work and equip them with the skills and knowledge necessary to register as a social worker. Students will receive a bursary of £19,833 over the duration of the programme to support them whilst in training. Trainees will commence on the programme in January 2024 and finish in March 2025 and we are very excited to once again be able to support a cohort of students throughout the programme.

Triennial analysis of serious case reviews 2022

RiP have put together a series of new <u>open-access resources</u> to support professionals in social work, education, police, criminal justice and health in learning from the analysis of serious cases. These are based on learning from the <u>ninth and final periodic</u> review of serious case reviews, which looked at 235 serious case reviews relating to incidents between April 2017 and September 2019. They can be used in self-directed, team-based, or organisational continuing professional development.
